









Unit Objective:

To recall 10 places in a town and understand directions including prepositions in French.

By the end of this unit we will be able to:

- Recall 10 places in a town in French along with their respective definite articles/determiners.
- Follow 5 different directional instructions in French and their combinations.
- Ask where a location is and respond with a description of relative distance (nearby/far away) in French.
- Use prepositions to give the precise location of one place in relation to another in French.
- Conduct a dialogue in French about where places are in a town using transactional language.

It will help if we already know:

- The letter sounds (phonics & phonemes) from 'Phonics & Pronunciation' lessons 1, 2, 3 & 4.
- Language introduced from in key Intermediate units such as 'Presenting Myself', 'At the Tea Room', 'My Home' and 'Do You Have A Pet?'.
- · What a preposition is in English.

Skills we will develop:

To be able to ask and understand directions in French regarding 10 key places in a town and give a more precise location of one place in relation to another.

To begin to pay more attention to the changes involved with prepositions and the different articles/determiners in French and apply these rules when using prepositions in future topics.

Activities we will complete:

The unit starts with the nouns for 10 key places in French around a town. There will be plenty of activities in all 4 skills [speaking, listening, reading and writing] to then build an authentic dialogue integrating the different town locations, with key transactional language and directional instructions in French by the end of the unit.

Grammar we will learn & revisit:

Definite articles/determiners in French for masculine and feminine nouns and those beginning with a vowel or 'h muet'.

Prepositions: examples and clear explanation of how prepositions can change in combination with these definite articles/determiners in French.

Phonics & pronunciation we will see:

Recommended phonics focus: É, È, EAU

- É sound in supermarché, musée, école and côté
- È sound in bibliothèque and près
- EAU sound in beaucoup
- Silent letters: The 's' is not pronounced in près and puis, and the 't' is not pronounced in droit. These two consonants are often silent when seen at the end of words in French.
- Guttural 'R': Becoming more familiar with the French 'r' sound as seen in gare, restaurant, centre, supermarché. The sound is made from the back of the mouth, not the front.

Vocabulary we will learn & revisit:

The nouns for 10 places in French in a town with a range of directions to describe how to reach them as well as phrases for asking and answering where a place is located in a town. Transactional language will be covered. All listed on the Unit Glossary.
